











A Closer Look at Diocesan Operations

Part of our ongoing journey of discipleship calls for us to acknowledge gifts given to us from God and then use them to serve others. Just as each person must be accountable, the Church must also be accountable for the gifts entrusted to us. Accountability demonstrates organizational responsibility and transparency, and shows our people that the gifts they have entrusted to us are being well-utilized to carry out the work of Christ.

The purpose of this Annual Report is to account for income received and how that income was utilized to provide for the needs of the larger Church through annual operations as well as special needs collection drives. In essence, our goal is to provide an overview of the many ways your donation is impacting lives.

The ministries of the Diocese of St. Petersburg operate on a very tight annual budget, relying on a combination of revenue (or income) sources which totaled \$15,311,495 in 2017. These sources include investment income, bequests, donations and grants, program fees, parish assessments and direct donations to the Annual Pastoral Appeal, which is the largest revenue source and provided almost \$10 million of the total revenue for 2017.


Our goal is to maintain a balanced budget every year. This means that each year we try to budget and keep our total operating expenses equal to projected revenue. A review of our 2017 actuals revealed we were able to keep our expenses just below total revenue. Inspiring HOPE through Vocations

Annual Pastoral Appeal



Through generous donations across the Diocese, there is hope for the future of our Catholic faith. The Office of Vocations works in collaboration with parishes and schools across the Diocese to raise vocation awareness. Your support allows us to offer workshops, materials, and discernment events and activities.

According to research, 11-year-olds and 11th graders think a lot about their vocation, their purpose in life, so our diocese implements programs to help our Catholic school youth with discernment. Our vocation awareness for Catholic schools has three parts. The first part, the Focus 11 Vocations Rally, is attended by all 6th graders in the Diocese over two days every February. It includes a keynote speaker, address by the Bishop, a scavenger hunt among booths represented by the Serra Club, Knights of Columbus, religious orders, and Spirit FM, a panel discussion, music, and prayer. Re-Focus, the second part, is a two hour rally for 9th graders in four of our diocesan high schools. The final part targets 11th and 12th graders through talks and presentations from our seminarians.

This year, 960 11-year-olds, 700 9th graders, and 1,000 11th and 12th graders participated in vocation awareness programs.



Providing HOPE to our Brothers & Sisters in Need

Annual Pastoral Appeal





Through Catholic Social Services, the Office of Life Ministry offers hope to pregnant and alienated women whose future seems dim. Donations to our Annual Pastoral Appeal have provided these women the encouragement and resources they need to consider life as a successful alternative to abortion. Pregnant Yolanda was homeless, jobless, shunned by her boyfriend, and feeling like abortion was her only option. Outside of the abortion clinic she visited, a group of people were praying for her and began to talk with her about her options. Yolanda was introduced to people from Catholic Charities.

Through this encounter, she prayed and found God's mercy, grace, and eventually hope. In collaboration, Life Ministry's 40 Days for Life program, Catholic Charities, and Mary's Outreach, changed Yolanda's life. This year, she gave birth to a healthy baby boy, has a place to live, secured a job, and is working hard to create a good life for herself and son.

558 Catholic leaders work with our Life Ministry Offices to orchestrate pro-life efforts throughout our five counties, saving lives for Christ.

Liturgical Ministry Workshops

Annual training for experienced and new Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and readers served 327 attendees from 32 parishes throughout the Diocese.



The Order of Celebrating Matrimony

Five workshops were offered for 145 attendees from 57 parishes consisting of priests, deacons, musicians, and anyone responsible for the preparation of the wedding liturgy at the parish to present the new ritual book at the end of 2016.



Sacristans Workshop

The workshop for 200 new and experienced Sacristans from 44 parishes covered information pertinent to their ministry and allowed for their questions.



Diocesan RCIA Institute

The institute covered the Period of Inquiry for **153 participants from 30 parish** RCIA teams in English and Spanish.

Building HOPE for our Future

Forward in Faith

In the fall of 2013, Bishop Emeritus Robert N. Lynch launched the *Forward in Faith* Campaign in every parish throughout our diocese. By December of 2016, over 16,600 donors from our 81 parishes and missions raised \$32 million in pledges with almost \$22 million in payments to support specifically outlined projects including:

- A new residence and updated education facilities for our seminarians at St. Vincent de Paul Regional Seminary
- A new building for our oldest regional Catholic school, St. Anthony of Padua in San Antonio
- The completion of the new regional Mother Teresa of Calcutta Catholic School in Lutz

The donations collected also supported a major component of the campaign: Parish Share. Through this initiative, 20% of all funds raised in a parish would be returned to the parish for local projects. This past winter, the Diocese was pleased to return more than \$1.6 million to the 24 parishes that completed campaign efforts in the fall of 2013:

The leadership of each parish outlined various projects to complete with Parish Share funds such as maintenance and/or repair projects, construction of food pantry or community service centers, and local program development. "Forward in Faith made it possible for us to reach our goal a year in advance so that we could get under construction a year early. It has been a great blessing," said Reverend Monsignor Ronald Aubin, Pastor of Our Lady of the Rosary.

We are excited to report that the remainder of parishes that completed the campaign in the fall of 2014 will receive their first Parish Share disbursement in January of 2018, estimated at over \$2 million!
