In order to communicate effectively with parishieners, the Office of Communications is effecting these recommendations.

OUSLY with parishioners, the Office of Communications is offering these recommendations:

## STAY CONNECTED WITH YOUR COMMUNITY

- Ask parishioners to update their contact information, especially their email address, so they can be contacted with updates. If you have Flocknote, it is easy to collect email addresses through a "Text to Join" process.
- Call parishioners to see how they are doing.
- Ask parishioners to accept notifications via your parish app, so they can be alerted of updates.
- Encourage parishioners to bookmark your website and "Like" your Facebook page (and/or other social media channels) to stay up to date on communications.
- Remind parishioners about electronic giving options in lieu of weekly envelopes.
- Review your ability to livestream the Mass for those who stay home due to illness or other concerns.
  Pastors may need to offer a Mass or prayer service via livestream, Facebook Live or a pre-recorded video to post on your website. Please contact Maria Mertens from the Diocesan Office of Communications, <u>mrm@dosp.org</u> with livestream options.
