

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ANIMUS

The Church teaches that there are four lifelong vocations, priesthood, religious life, marriage, and consecrated single life. All of these vocations are authentic calls from God. In other words, God has a particular call for each of us, a call that is as unique and particular to us as we are in the world. Therefore, no call or vocation is better or worse than another. They are equal in the eyes of God and He calls each and every one of us to live out our lives in one of these particular ways. Living our lives out in the way God has created and called us to live will bring complete fulfillment and joy. That doesn't mean we won't have sacrifices, struggles, and pain. But it does mean that the graces, gifts, and blessings received will far outweigh any of the negative things encountered.

Knowing that these vocations are equal and given by God is one thing, knowing which one am I called to is quite another. Figuring out or discerning our particular call is one of the most difficult things any of us attempt. This is particularly true for us in the age and culture in which we live. This age where everything is immediate can lead us to think that only immediate satisfaction brings about happiness. It grows as we grow and discerning how we are to live to achieve that joy is vital.

The importance and difficulty of discernment is why we put so much effort into helping our young people discern God's call in their lives. On the cover of this newsletter you can see that we begin a new discernment group that will meet under the direction of Fr. Chuck Dornquast. This group will meet for breakfast and then discuss topics that are pertinent in helping one discern their call in life. Meeting as a group of likeminded individuals is very beneficial because it demonstrates that one is not alone in discernment. It is also very important to have someone that is living out their vocation to lead and moderate the discussion. The Office of Vocations thanks Fr. Chuck very much for his willingness to moderate and lead this group.

I just started my second year at St. John
Vianney College Seminary and can't wait
to see how the year unfolds! This year I am
taking less introductory courses and diving
more into philosophy. It's interesting to see
how people viewed the world before Christ

I'll never forget my first day at the seminary. It seems like yesterday I was staring at the ceiling on that first night wondering, "How did I get here? Is this God's plan for my life?" The question still finds its way back to me, but I remember when the Lord first called me, and I trust that he has led me here for a reason.

Last year I came in with my head held high. I thought seminary would be a breeze and set unreal expectations for myself. I thought that once I entered seminary, I would magically turn in to a great saint and convert the whole world! I learned quickly that the road to becoming a saint is not a one-time decision, but a daily choice. "If any man should come after me, let him deny himself, pick up his cross daily, and come follow me." Those are the words of our Lord. The seminary is a place of formation. A lot has happened in the past 14 months and I wouldn't change it for the world! I have grown much closer to God, I've made some of the greatest friends of my life, and continue to grow in faith, hope, and love each day.

After being ordained to the diaconate last April alongside my classmates, I've discovered a new freedom and joy in my vocational ministry. After years of discerning, questioning, struggling, and hair-pulling (both from me and from Fr. Carl, I'm sure), to finally say

At the parish, I've been given the opportunity to preside over several baptisms, and this past weekend I had the joy of baptizing two beautiful baby girls, Emma and Emilia. Being new to this whole "baptizing" thing, it can be a little bit stressful to start out. But when it comes for the actual baptism, there is an incredible moment of grace – I can barely describe it to you. When I poured the water over those little girls' heads, they looked right at me, and I knew that from that moment forward, their entire lives were changed – they are now daughters of God, and for all of eternity, I have the privilege of sharing that moment with them.


