# Florida Law

#### Jeffrey Johnston Stand Up for All Students Act Written into law on April 30, 2008

#### • Title XLVIII of the K-20 Education Code - Fs 1006.47

- "Bullying" means systematically and chronically inflicting physical hurt or psychological distress on one or more students and may involve:
- 1. Teasing;
- 2. Social exclusion;
- 3. Threat;
- 4. Intimidation;
- 5. Stalking;
- 6. Physical violence;
- 7. Theft;
- 8. Sexual, religious, or racial harassment;
- 9. Public humiliation; or
- 10. Destruction of property

# **Bullying Defined**

- Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior among school aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time.
- Both kids who are bullied and who bully others may have serious, lasting problems.

# Is it Bullying?

- Aggressive Behavior
- Imbalance of Power
  - Real or Perceived
  - Such as physical strength, access to embarrassing information, or status
- Repetition
  - Bullying behaviors happen more than once or have the potential to happen more than once.

# How to handle bullying

# **Practical Suggestions**

- Listen to all parties involved.
- Be objective and sincere
- Reach out to the school counselor or principal before any decisions are made. Do not contact parents without seeking advice from either school counselor or administration
- Understand normal social conflict
- Document and keep records
- If parents persist, contact your administration. Do not engage with persistent parents

## Reporting

# Must be reported in WRITING as follows:

## Reporting

 Schools should require parents or students to complete the Bullying Complaint Form before an official investigation begins.

• The form should be submitted to the school administration and handled at the school level.

#### **Next Steps**

Parents who feel the situation has not been resolved by the school administration may bring their concern to the Office of Catholic Schools and Centers. An online form is available for parents to complete.

# **TIPS For Teachers**

- People who are hurting want to be have their concerns heard by someone who cares.
- Listening, understanding, and following up with students and parents and crucial to the success of the process.
- Follow the school handbook for policy.
- Think outside the box for consequences for bullying. If typical punishments worked, we would not have repeated bullying.
